Activities in 2011

Coasts and Ports Conference

From 28-30 September PIANC Australia, together with Engineers Australia and the Institute of Professional Engineers New Zealand, hosted the preeminent industry conference "Coasts and Ports 2011". The conference is the amalgamation of the 20th Australasian Coastal and Ocean Engineering conference and the 13th Australasian Port and Harbour Conference. The conference was held in Perth and was strongly attended with over 400 delegates from Australia and across the globe.

Thomas Wakeman Dr opened the conference on behalf of PIANC Australia with an interesting challenging keynote address on the issues faced in coordinating port infrastructure growth against the rapid growth that has been seen in the size of commercial vessels. Dr Wakeman noted the difficulties with the time required to undertake port upgrades when compared to the rate at which new generation (larger) vessels are being developed and released into the market. The challenge is on for nations to determine how best to develop transport infrastructure networks to accommodate these new generation vessels and take

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advantage of the economies of scale that they offer.

Young Authors Award 2011

Luke Campbell of Aztec Analysis won the 2011 PIANC Australia Young Authors Award for his paper titled *"Rapid Bay Jetty: Case Study"* and receives 2-years of free membership

Dredging Workshop

The conference was preceded by a two day PIANC workshop themed "Dredging: Environmental Approvals and Management". The workshop was also well attended, with delegates attending across the different stakeholder from groups. The workshop included a number of case studies, regulatory updates and panel discussion sessions. A open discussion paper is planned to document and present the outcomes of the final open panel session in which a number of key environmental approval issues and recommendations for approval process and impact knowledge improvements were raised.

PIANC/Maritime Panel Seminar August

A PIANC Maritime Panel joint seminar on 'Vulnerability of Australian Coasts and Ports to Natural Extreme Events' was held in Sydney on 15 August 2011. About 100 interested professionals attended the seminar where 7 experts put forward presentations on various aspects. The Seminar was chaired by Maritime Panel Chairman and PIANC Board member, Alan Betts and the discussion was moderated by PIANC Board member, Assoc Prof Ron Cox.

Marina Excellence Design Jack Nichol Award (MEDA).

Mandurah Ocean Marina won the 2011 Marina Excellence Design Jack Nichol Award. Mandurah, the second largest city in Western Australia located approximately 70 km south of Perth

Mandurah Ocean Marina is a 62-hectare development of a mixed-use fully integrated marina combining maritime, residential, commercial, tourism and recreational areas, the first of its kind in Australia. The range of amenities and services at the development include residential and resort accommodations, cafes. restaurants. retail shops, entertainment venues, beaches and parks and a host of activities for boating and fishing enthusiasts. Within the twin harbours there is permanent moorage for 639 vessels with 390 recreational, 36 commercial, 213 club slips; recreational berths range in size from 8 to 20 metres and commercial berths 15 to 25 metres. Separate boat launch facilities are provided for trailer vessels, with parking for up to 80 trailers, and non-powered

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craft (small sailboats, canoes and kayaks) in addition to a hardstand storage area and stacking facility for up to 245 vessels. Visitor berths for small recreational craft to luxury yachts are located alongside the boardwalk. A full suite of marina support facilities are available, including speciallywheelchair fishing designed access, restrooms, showers, food service, fishing and sailing club. Aesthetically, the marina was developed to ensure a natural, seamless transition from the older city centre to the new facilities.

An iconic pedestrian suspension bridge links the two Harbours.
